

Friends assist with Purple Martin Houses By Carly Hirschmann, Friends of the Refuge

Purple Martins are the largest swallows in North America. Their beauty was once commonplace in Oregon, yet their populations severely declined starting in the 1950's. One possible cause for their significant disappearance is the competition for nesting cavities with invasive European starlings. Another possibility is the loss of snags and nesting cavities due to changing foresting practices. Aside from a handful of sites on Oregon's West Coast, this species has shifted almost entirely to rely on man-made structures for nesting. The Western sub-species of the Purple Martin is listed as "critically sensitive" in Oregon. This means that conservation actions are required to prevent the bird from ending up on the Endangered Species List. Several nearby protected areas have had success in attracting Purple Martins to man-made nesting structures, including Fernhill Wetlands and Ridgefield National Wildlife Refuge.



We are hoping to provide a new home for these swooping beauties at our own Refuge! We will be adding 12 new nest boxes to our main unit. The boxes will be out in the open in the middle of the wetland, and visible from the viewing platform with a scope or binoculars. There will be three poles, about 15 ft. high, with four nest boxes hanging on each. We are hoping that there will be an opportunity to get a closer look at the nest boxes via a short walk on our seasonal trail. An interesting yet counterintuitive fact about these birds is that they actually prefer nesting sites which are closer to people. Restoration Update from Carly

We have wrapped up our amphibian egg mass and waterfowl survey seasons at the Refuge! Tundra Swans could be seen for a few weeks on our main unit, and Canvasbacks, a large species of diving duck, made an appearance at Wapato Lake National Wildlife Refuge. A multitude of wildlife have been spotted around

Wapato Lake as the weather warms up, including: coyotes, gophers, and the first deer seen at the edge of the lakebed. A large beaver lodge has also appeared in the middle of the lakebed.









We had a very successful amphibian egg mass survey season! Hundreds of long-toed salamander and pacific chorus frog egg masses were found, along with a decent number of red-legged frog and northwestern salamander egg masses. Most exciting was the amount of red-legged egg masses we found in the Chicken Creek Channel! The Chicken Creek project is an ongoing restoration effort, and we are already witnessing the benefits it's providing to wildlife on the Refuge.

New Refuge Phone System

The Refuge has new phones and a new phone system. Now when you call the main Refuge number you will get an automated menu with options for: a directory, hours of operation, trail status, and getting re-routed to the state Fish & Wildlife office for injured wildlife calls. To reach someone at the Refuge, you can either wait and listen through the menu or use the first option of the directory to be connected to a specific person. If anyone was in the habit of using previous extensions, they now have '15' added to the beginning of the number (e.g. Friends office extension is now 15227).
